Purpose of the Event...

The first Conference under the new Buckinghamshire Safeguarding Children Partnership (BSCP) model was an opportunity for local practitioners to learn about the changes to local safeguarding arrangements, as well as to consider themes which have emerged from a decade of local Serious Case Reviews.

Over 100 practitioners attended the event from across the Children's Workforce, with representation from:

Julie Davies, Head of Children's Quality Standards and Performance at Buckinghamshire County Council and Chair of the Performance & Quality Assurance Sub Group of the BSCP, opened the conference by welcoming attendees to the event and setting out the focus and expectations of the day.

Julie was followed on stage by Gilly Attree, Chair of the Performance, Policy & Practice Sub Group of the BSCP.

Gilly was representing the **Buckinghamshire Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG)** - one of the three key partners for the new BSCP model. Gilly's presentation provided the audience with a clear overview as to the future plan of the CCGs; both in terms of the organisations long term plans for sustainability and transformation, and investment into services.

The BSCP were delighted to welcome **Michelle Plaisted - Kerr - Training and Development Manager from Reducing the Risk of Domestic Abuse -** who presented an oversight into the issue of "<u>Domestic Abuse and Families</u>"

Reducing the Risk of Domestic Abuse



Michelle has over 20 years experience in the field of domestic and sexual abuse.

For the past 10 years, she has been developing and delivering on our Domestic Abuse Champions Network across the Thames Valley.

The company has trained over 3,000 champions.

<u>Domestic Abuse</u> has been identified as one of the <u>key factors</u> in multiple SCRs in Buckinghamshire over the <u>past 10 years</u>...

Following a short refreshment break, **Nick John** - **Executive Partner for Thames Valley Police** - spoke about the role of the TVP as another of the three key partners within the new arrangements.

Nick provided attendees with an understanding as to how the TVP Protecting Vulnerable People (PVP) structure works within the local authority; acknowledging that PVP

is one cog making up part of the whole multi - agency partnership wheel.



"As part of the safeguarding workforce we all share priorities for issues such as:

The morning session was rounded up with an engaging talk by **Alex Britton** on "<u>Understanding Parental Learning</u>
<u>Disabilities</u>". Alex is the **Head of Advocacy and Practice Development at Talkback**, where she has led engagement and advocacy projects for people with learning disabilities over the past 10 years.

Alex, who has over 30 years experience working with people with a learning disability and autism, has trained in self advocacy, Positive Behaviour Support and Gentle Teaching approaches, as well as Intensive Interaction.

Talkback's roots are in self advocacy; in empowering people with a learning disability and/or autism to have their voices heard and to have choice and control over their lives.

Talkback provides support and self-advocacy projects to reduce loneliness and isolation, and to promote resilience, independence and autonomy; they aim to break cycles of so-called challenging behaviour through working with individuals to learn about their communication, their experience and their world.

Talkback's training, research and consultation work has influenced health, social care and education agendas, both locally and nationally, pioneering ways to place people's experience at the heart of service development.



The afternoon was kicked off with an in-depth look at the issue of "Child Criminal Exploitation".

This hard hitting presentation from **SPACE** focused on the dangers for young people entrenched in County Lines and looked at ways in which professional intervention can better support these vulnerable adolescents and their families.

What is County Lines?

'County Lines' is a term used when drug gangs from big cities expand their operations to smaller towns, often using violence to drive out local dealers and exploiting children and vulnerable people to sell drugs.

These dealers will use dedicated mobile phone lines, known as 'deal lines', to take orders from drug users.

Since its conception, SPACE has supported numerous families effected by County Lines by providing guidance and advocacy, campaigned for changes within the current professional response and provided training to equip professionals and the wider community who encounter County Lines by sharing lived experience and insight.



Delegates were given an opportunity to feedback and ask questions directly to all of the events presenters, as well as the Executive Partners (and their representatives).

This exercise was incredibly thought provoking and highlighted the united and determined response from across the children's workforce to better understand the issues impacting on children currently working with services and to identify ways we can all look to better support those who are most vulnerable within our community.

The conference was closed by Richard Nash, Service Director for Children's Social Care, Buckinghamshire County Council and Chair of the Exploitation Sub Group of the BSCP.

"In response to the wider issues of Exploitation, the Swan Unit has been restructured into the new Exploitation Hub".
